SPELLING BEE

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1 INT. LARGE AUDITORIUM-DAY

We're at the Scripps Spelling Bee. The judges are on one side of the stage, the contestants, all kids, on the other. There is a microphone in the middle of the stage. The pronouncer, MR. BAILLY, speaks.

> MR. BAILLY Welcome to round two of the Scripps National Spelling Bee. Up first is Justine Henderson.

JUSTINE walks up to the microphone.

MR. BAILLY Justine, your word is sagacity.

JUSTINE Sagacity. Sagacity. Sa-ga-ci-ty. Definition?

MR. BAILLY Sagacity. The quality of being sagacious.

JUSTINE Um...is there a definition for sagacious?

MR. BAILLY Probably! But that's not your word! It's sagacity, remember? You said it like 12 times.

JUSTINE

But that-that definition doesn't tell me what the word means, so it doesn't--

MR. BAILLY

Too bad! That's the definition. It's not wrong. Look it up! Sagacity, the quality of being sagacious. That's what you get.

JUSTINE Oh--ok. Ok. Um...country of origin?

Pangaea. JUSTINE is silent, wide-eyed and confused. MR. BAILLY Spell the fucking word, Justine. JUSTINE (stuttering) Sa-sagacity. Um, S-A-G-A-S-I--MR. BAILLY (yelling) Wrong! Sit down. (beat) You kids get too many hints. There is a first grader in the bee this year. Are you kidding me? Shit's too easy. This is why no one takes us seriously as a competitive sport. Time to up the ante. Next! Jamari Price. JAMARI walks up to the microphone, visibly nervous. MR. BAILLY Jamari, your word is semaphore. JAMARI Semaphore. Semaphore. Part of speech? MR. BAILLY The good part. JAMARI What? MR. BAILLY You heard me. Figure it out. JAMARI C-can you use it in a sentence? MR. BAILLY Absolutely. Semaphore is one of the words in the 2018 Scripps Spelling Bee. JAMARI I-I know that, I was hoping you could--

MR. BAILLY

MR. BAILLY Does LeBron James give defenders hints? Does he go (mocking, whiny voice) ooh, hey, Kevin Durant, just wanted to let you know I'm gonna pump fake and drive and Kevin Love's probably gonna set a screen for me! (aggressively) No. He doesn't. Now shut up and spell.

JAMARI Semaphore. S-E-M-I--

MR. BAILLY Nope! Bye. Next!

LILY CHU, visibly shaken, shuffles up to the microphone, head down.

MR. BAILLY Lily Chu! Your word is eudamonic [yoo-dee-mah-nik].

LILY Yoo-dee-mah-nik?

MR. BAILLY Uh-day-moan-ik.

LILY Uh-day-moan-ik?

MR. BAILLY Eh-du-man-eek.

LILY You're saying it differently every time!

MR. BAILLY No I'm not, spell the word!!

LILY S--sorry, what--what's the word?

MR. BAILLY I will not repeat myself again! Time's running out, spell! LILY You, dah--um, mon. eek. Ok. Y-

MR. BAILLY (screaming) No! Sit down!

LILY'S mom, MRS. CHU, stands up from the audience.

MRS. CHU Excuse me! You are abusing these children, they can't spell without context!

MR. BAILLY That's not my problem honey! If Lily over here needs context, she should read a fuckin' book! Which she clearly hasn't, based on her spelling skills. Ok, next! One kid left, huh? Kevin, the first-grader. Of course.

KEVIN walks up to the microphone slowly. He is steely, determined.

MR. BAILLY

Kevin.

KEVIN

Mr. Bailly.

MR. BAILLY Your word is pilgarlic.

KEVIN Pilgarlic? The noun that means "a man looked upon with humorous contempt or mock pity?" As in,

Jacques Bailly is a bitter old pilgarlic who peaked at age 14 when he won the spelling bee?

MR. BAILLY You smug little--

KEVIN Pilgarlic. P-I-L-G-A-R-L-I-C. Pilgarlic.

KEVIN takes the mic out of its stand and holds it out in front of him, then drops it.
